

COMMUNITY WIDE CURBSIDE RESIDENTIAL ORGANIC WASTE COLLECTION PROGRAM

PURPOSE:

To seek direction on the design of a community-wide residential organic waste collection program, specifically as it relates to shifting to an alternating bi-weekly collection schedule for garbage and recycling, and the option to optout of organics collection for residents who backyard compost or otherwise divert organics from landfill.

Organic waste collection supports several plans and corporate directions:

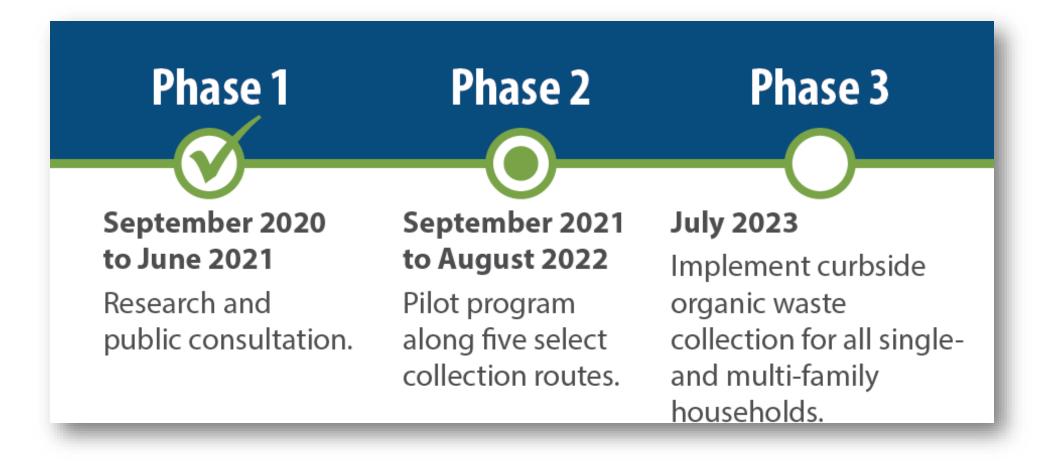
KAMPLAN's goal to reduce waste, adopt a zero-waste philosophy and implement waste diversion programs

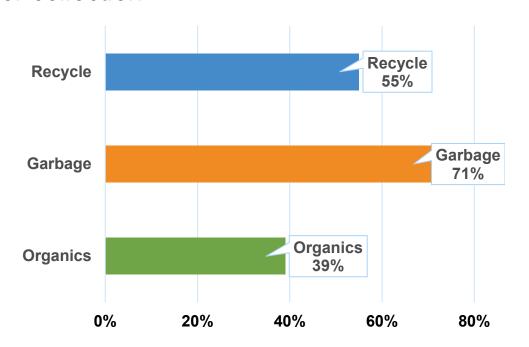

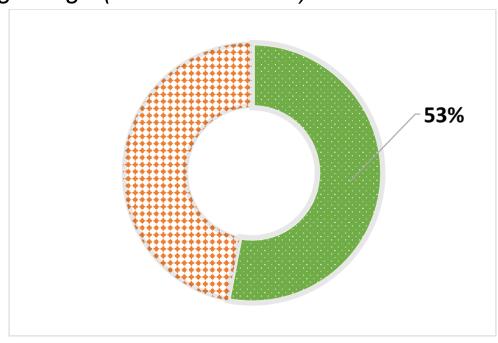
Participation Rate

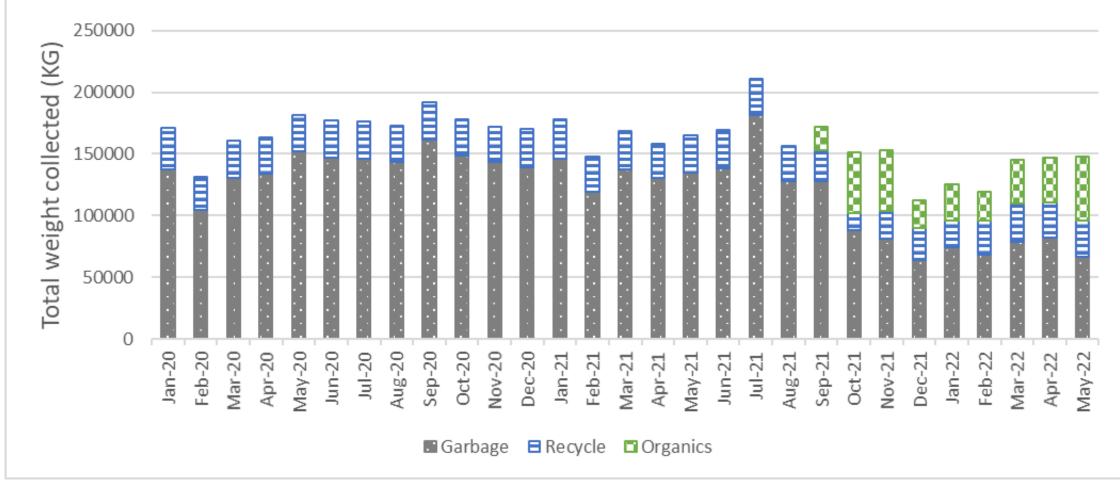

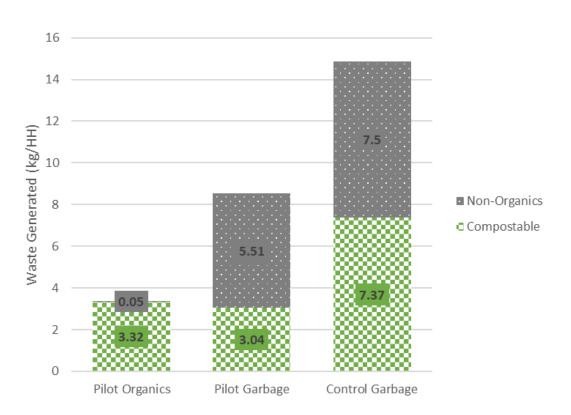


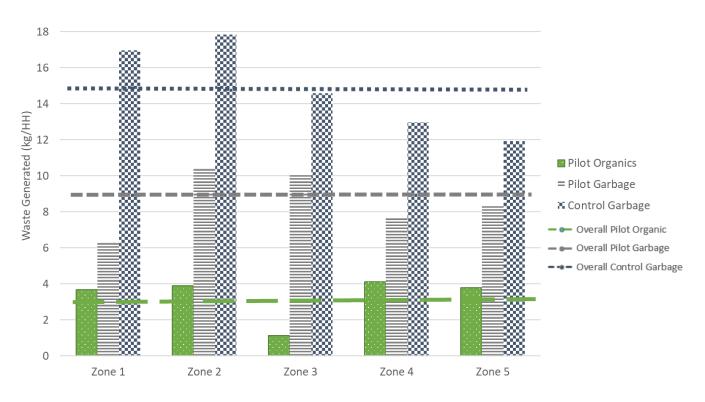
City Residential Collection Organics Pilot Routes Pre and Post Weights

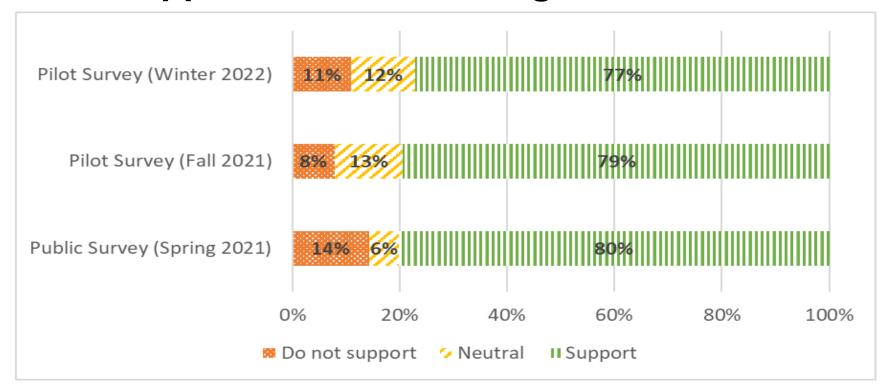
Weekly Waste Generation Comparison

Level of support for curbside organic waste collection

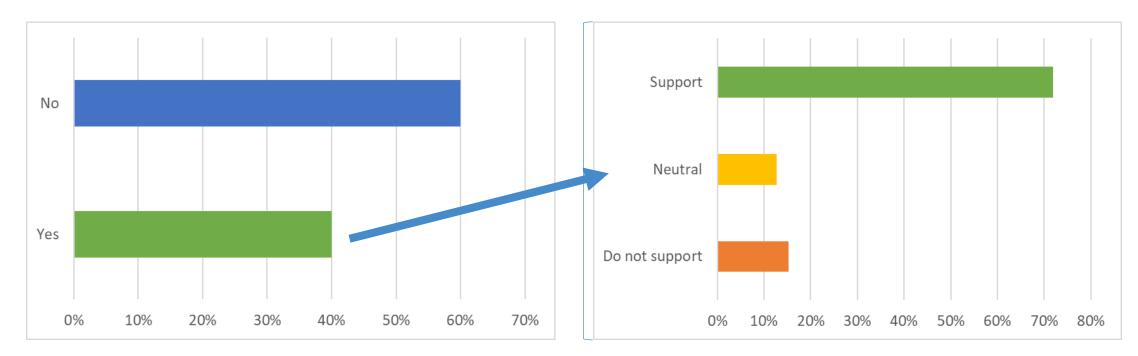




PILOT PARTICIPANT ENGAGEMENT

As a home composter, what is your level of support for organic waste collection?



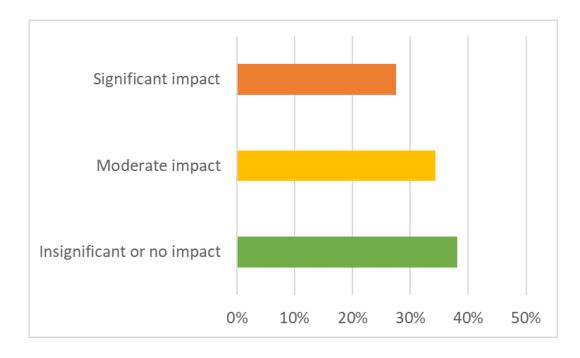


PILOT PARTICIPANT ENGAGEMENT

SUMMARY

- Solid Waste and Recyclables Amendment Bylaw 40-68 includes:
 - Authorizing a service for organic waste collection and adding a utility for the service
 - Adding definitions and changing clauses to account for the new service
 - Adding a fee for larger sized recycling cart
 - Changing service levels for garbage and recycling to bi-weekly
 - Increasing the rate for the 360 L garbage cart





SUMMARY

- Municipal Ticket Information Amendment Bylaw 43-17 includes offences and penalties for:
 - Failure to properly separate or dispose organics
 - Failure to properly store wildlife attractants





ALTERNATIVES

Recommended

- Implementation of a 4-day collection schedule
- City-supplied short-term supply of bin liners

Not Recommended

- Opt-out option for backyard composters
- Weekly collection of garbage and/ or recycling
- Bear-resistant containers

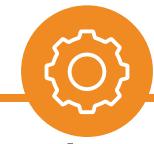
Two-pass System

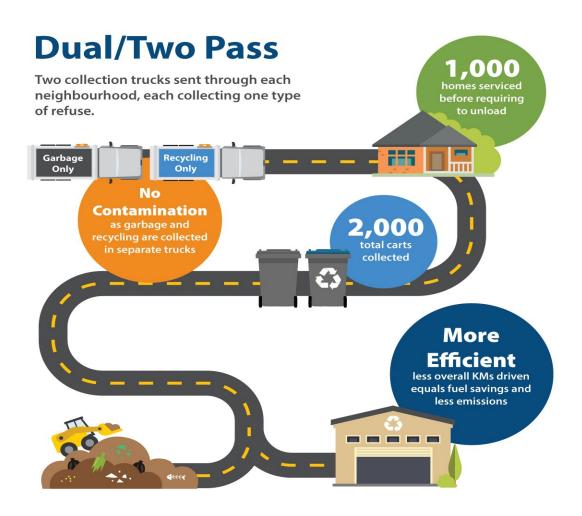
Request for four FTEs:

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RECOMMENDATION:

That the Committee of the Whole recommend that Council authorize:

- a) Solid Waste and Recyclables Amendment Bylaw No. 40-68, 2022 (Attachment C), be introduced and read a first, second, and third time
- b) Municipal Ticket Information Amendment Bylaw No. 43-17, 2022 (Attachment "D"), to be introduced and read a first, second, and third time



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RECOMMENDATION:

- c) subject to adoption of Bylaw No. 40-68, authorize:
 - i) \$1,200,400 from the Solid Waste Reserve for additional capital costs including \$120,000 for City-provided kitchen bin liners for community-wide implementation
 - ii) the addition of four FTEs to support administration and operations
- d) The Corporate Services Director to update the 2022-2026 Financial Plan accordingly
