FIVE YEAR FINANCIAL PLANNING

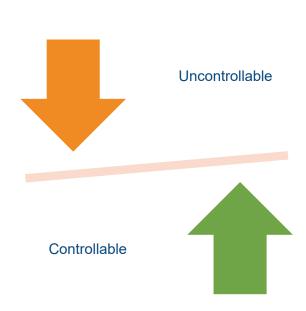
- Assume steady growth in Kamloops
- Continue to keep a longer-term focus when addressing infrastructure needs
- Forecast the future with available information
- Cautious estimate of tax growth revenue as some new development does not directly increase the tax base (residential vs. institutional)





HOW WE PLAN

- The annual budget is developed based on determining costs to deliver at the current Council-approved service levels
- The delivery of the budget uses a combination of:
 - zero-based budgeting practices,
 - analysis of past spending trends for costs where certainty is difficult to predict,
 - identifying factors in the economic environment, and
 - the use of reserves to help minimize the immediate impact or fund one-time initiatives







HOW WE PLAN

Final Budget & Supplementals

- A new request that is not funded in the current budget or a change to existing service levels
- Combination of internal (staff) or external (community) driven
- Community driven requests are reviewed by staff in consultation with initiators and all requests are provided to Council for consideration







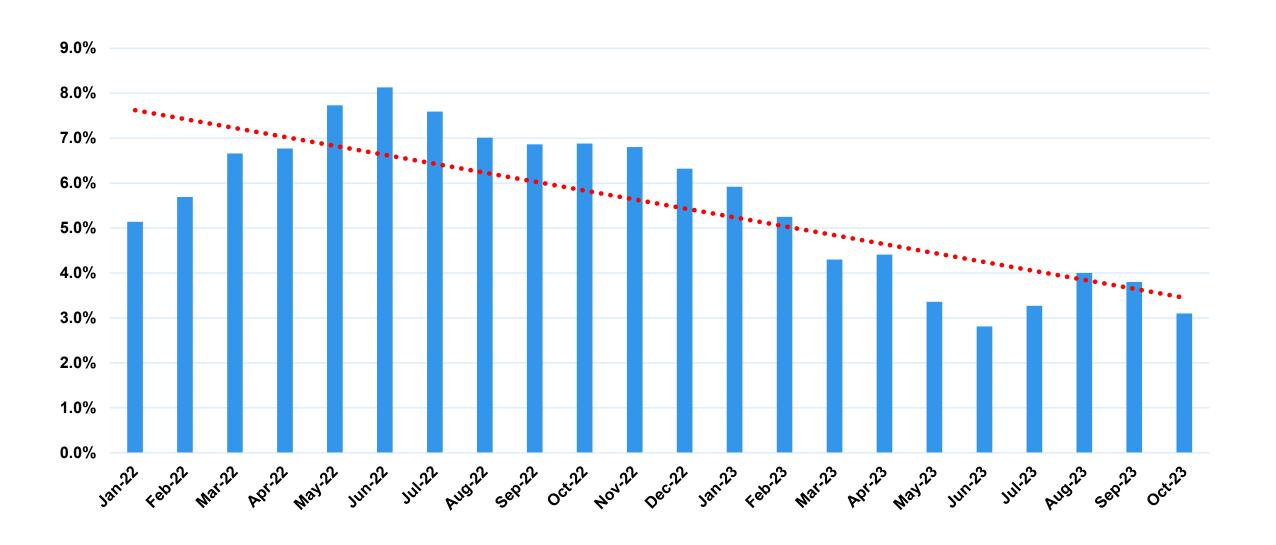
RISK TO THE BUDGET

 - Inflation and increased interest rates
 - Expired and to be negotiated union contracts
 - Supply Chain concerns
 - Skilled Labour shortages
 - BC Assessment Roll at Preview Stage





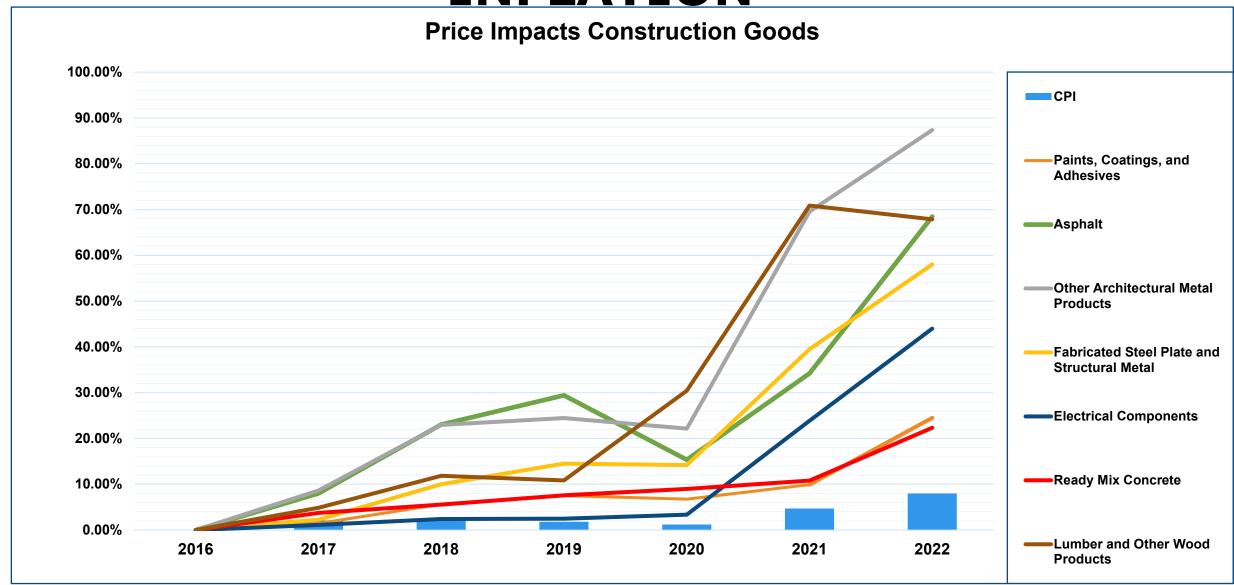

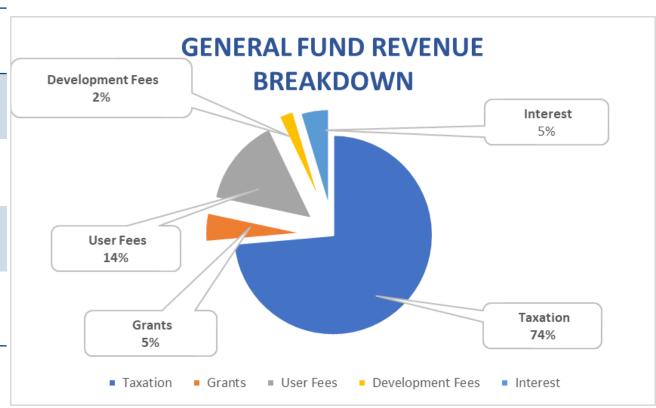




Canada's Tournament Capital

Keep in Mind:

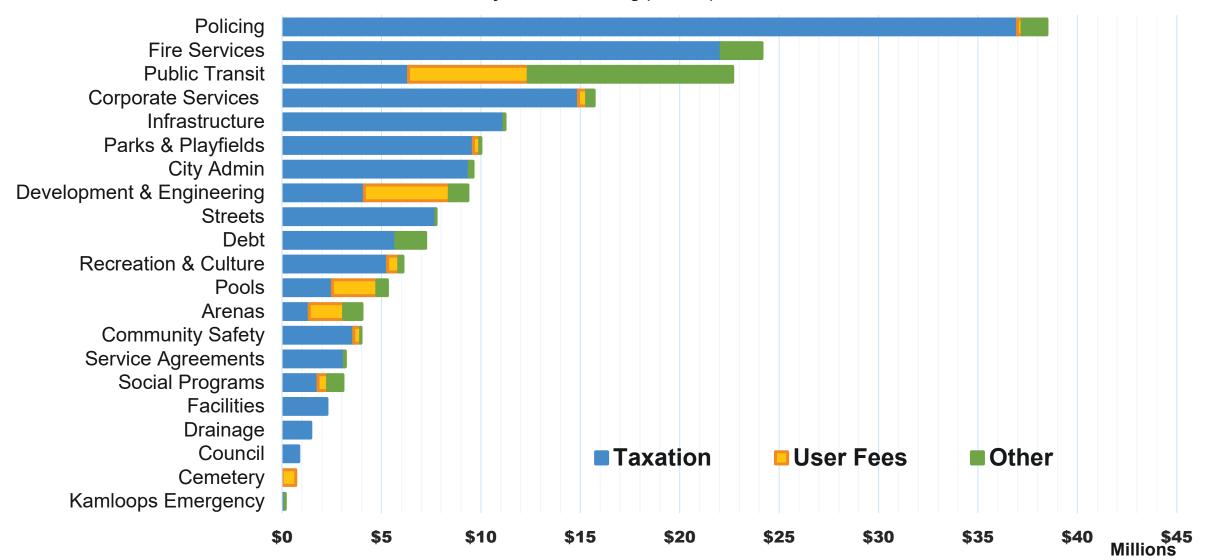
- 2023 Tax Base was \$134,659,000
- 1% of Taxation is approximately \$1.35 million
- 1% tax funding increase is approximately \$25 to the average household (subject to mill rate and assessed property value reconciliation)

When considering value for the city services provided, it may be helpful to consider many of the services are 24/7. Municipal employees are always on call and deal with a wide variety of situations, from fires and floods to blocked drains and clearing snow.

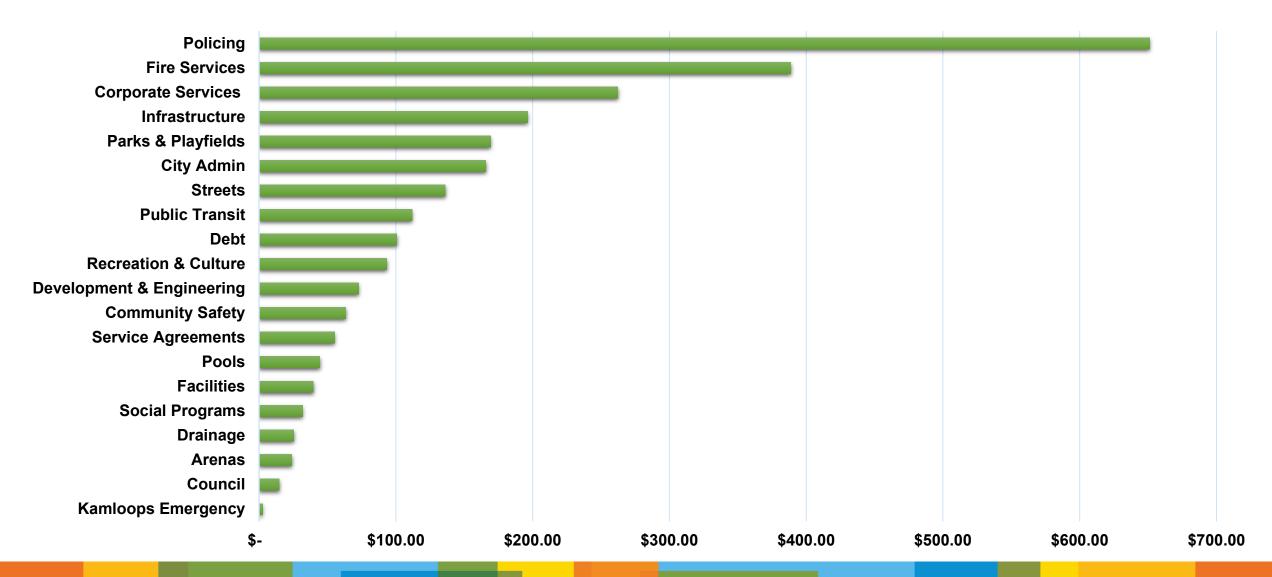
Some specific cost items:

- The cost to purchase one fire truck \$1,200,000us
- The cost of an additional RCMP member \$225,000
- The annual cost of insurance for city assets \$900,000
- The cost to resurface one kilometer of roadway \$300,000
- The cost to install signals at one intersection \$500,000

- RCMP union contract expired in March 2023
- CUPE contract expires at the end of the year
- IAFF contract expired at the end of 2021

Transit services impacted by inflation however has recovered beyond pre-pandemic levels

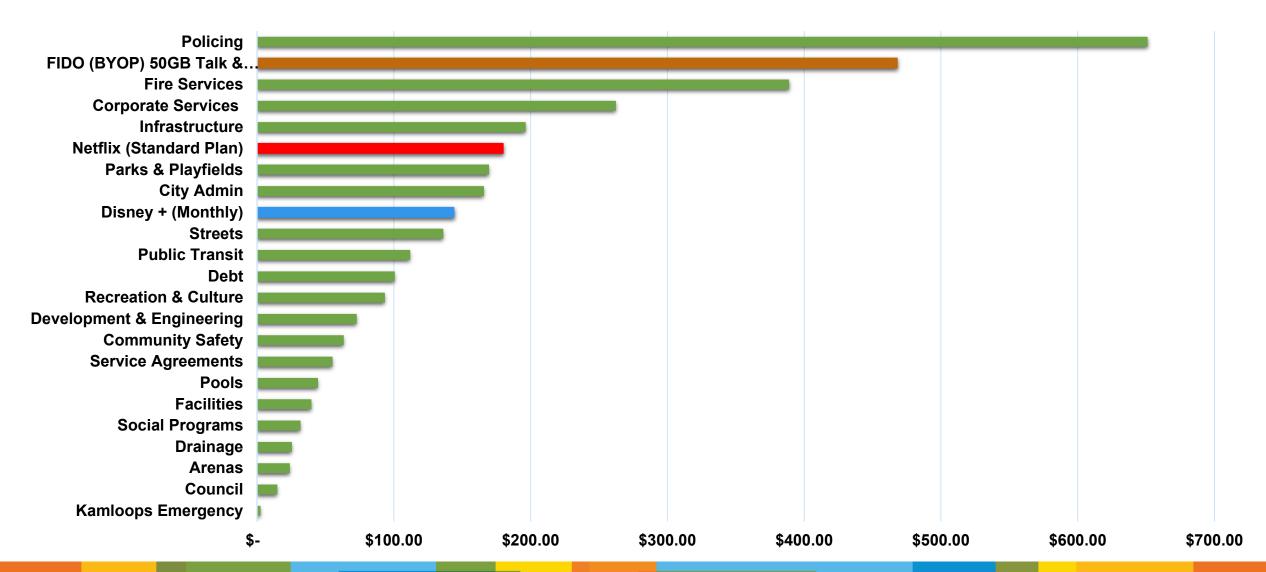
