

## SUMMARY OF KEY REVISIONS

Since presenting the draft Community Climate Action Plan (CCAP) to the Committee of the Whole on April 20, 2021, the following key revisions were made to the CCAP based on input received from the public, Council, advisory group, and City staff during Phase 4 engagement activities.

Emissions Modelling	Changed graph wedge title to "Reductions from existing policies and plans of City, provincial, and federal governments."	Suggestion to improve clarity.	Advisory group, Committee of the Whole
	Added a summary of modelling methodology in the appendices.	There were a few questions around how specific emissions sectors were modelled.	Engagement sessions, Advisory group
Big Move 1 Low-Carbon Development	Added on-site renewable energy as a regulatory option to explore in strategy 1C-Green New Neighbourhoods.	Clean electricity is not limited to the grid. Having the option to install on-site renewable energy at time of construction could help to make the development more marketable as owners will benefit from lower utility bills despite the higher electricity demand from supplying power to heat pumps and electric vehicles.	Engagement sessions, Advisory group
Big Move 2 Car-Light Community	Renamed strategy 2B to Optimize Transit Service (formerly Optimize Transit and School Bus Service) and moved an action ("Advocate to the Province and School District No. 73 to extend school bus service levels...") to the plan's advocacy section.	To make the strategy's intent more clear (i.e. it is not about integrating the two services). Action moved to advocacy section for consistency (i.e. advocacy-type actions are grouped in the plan's advocacy section).	Advisory group
Big Move 5 Zero-Waste/ Circular Economy	Revised strategy 5A action to "Implement a residential organics collection program, establishing a curbside service before expanding to include multi-family buildings."	To provide clarity as several questions were received around plans to manage organic waste from multi-family housing, apartments, etc. While the initial pilot program is limited to residential curbside service (i.e. single-family dwellings), multi-family buildings are to be considered in future phases of the project. Big Move 7 Municipal Climate Leadership	Added a statement within the context of Big Move 7 about the importance of fostering collaborations with Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc that enhance understanding of traditional ecological knowledge and Indigenous perspectives on environmental conservation and climate change.	Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc has important cultural perspectives on environmental conservation and climate change.	Advisory group
